## EDH TRASH FEES SET TO INCREASE

This summer El Dorado Hills residential customers will see a modest increase in their bi-monthly trash bills, as the El Dorado Hills Community Services District approved an annual cost of living adjustment at their board meeting June 11. The hike is tied to the year-over-year percentage change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). For the fiscal year 2014-15, the CPI in communities similar to El Dorado Hills rose 1.9 percent.

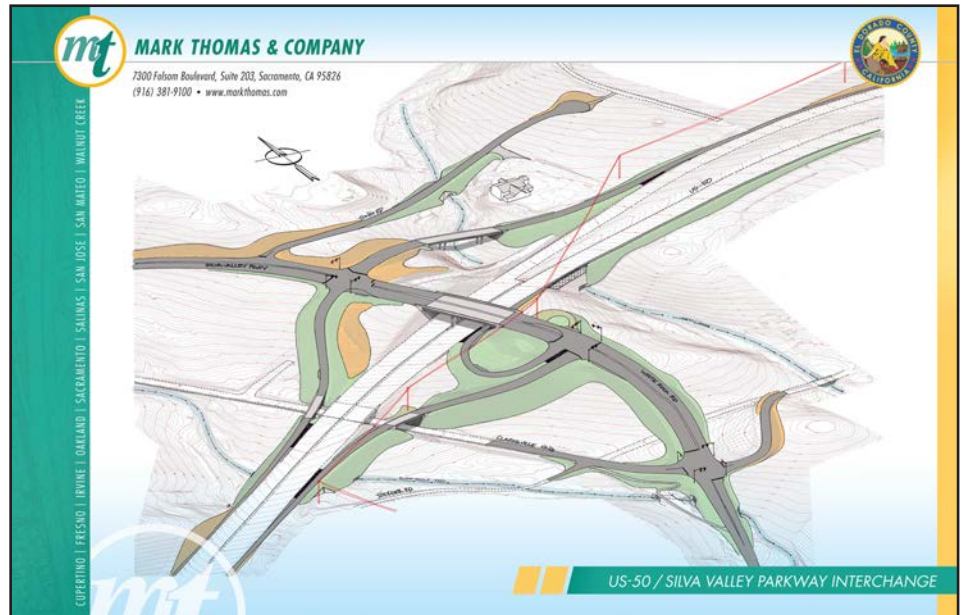
“We voted for the increase, because over the last year, El Dorado Disposal has fulfilled all the terms of their contract with the community. They have continued to provide excellent service to area residents,” said Board President Wayne Lowery.

The fee increase, however, is not county-wide. Each foothill community negotiates a separate contract with the disposal company. In Placerville, for example, annual rate adjustments are based on a combination of fuel prices and the CPI.

In El Dorado Hills, bi-monthly fees will go up to \$49.95 for a 35-gallon trash bin, \$53.54 for a 64-gallon bin, and \$73.74 for a 96-gallon trash bin. The rate for seniors over 65 will remain at \$41.26 for a 35-gallon trash bin.

However, the senior rate will go up to \$47.44 for a 64-gallon bin and go up to \$65.62 for a 96-gallon bin. The reason for no increase in the bottom-tier senior rate was the company’s concern about the cost impact upon senior citizens. “We understand many seniors are living on a fixed income,” said El Dorado Disposal District General Manager

## SILVA VALLEY INTERCHANGE CONSTRUCTION MORE THAN HALF WAY COMPLETED

El Dorado Hills residents will see big changes this summer. Crews will use the warm weather and long, sunny days to complete the new Silva Valley Parkway and, before the first hint of fall arrives, drivers will travel on the new roadway over Highway 50.

Completing the road is just one of many projects moving forward on the Silva Valley interchange, according to project engineer Aradhana Kochar with the El Dorado County Department of Transportation.

Crews have closed the freeway several times this year to blast away rock and debris, making more room for an auxiliary lane. They’ll also finish dismantling the old Tong Road, work on the interchange’s onramps and offramps and start making improvements on Clarsville Crossing (the old Silva Valley Road).

“Work is right on track,” Kochar said, noting the project is about 55 percent complete. “Things have been moving right along.”

Already in the completed column: Three of the project’s four bridges have gone up and the new Tong Road is open, allowing

access to Capital Korean Presbyterian.

The Silva Valley interchange includes a new four-lane Highway 50 overcrossing, new onramps/offramps with signalized intersections, and bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

The new Silva Valley Parkway will tie the interchange to White Rock Road (south side) and to the current Silva Valley Parkway (north side). The entire project has a cost of nearly \$30 million with funds coming from developer advances, the 2004 General Plan Silva Valley Interchange Set Aside Fund and a State and Local Partnership Program Grant.

In the works for decades, the interchange will relieve traffic congestion on El Dorado Hills Boulevard and serve as the end of the Capital Southeast Connector — a planned 35-mile parkway that will connect El Dorado County to Interstate 5 south of Elk Grove.

## PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Hello All,

We sure have been having some wild weather lately. First it was hot, then it got cold and rainy, with lots of thunder and lightning. Now we are heating up again, just like an ordinary July. I hope things settle down.

So what is ahead for us? According to the Japanese weather agency, chances are California will soon see an El Niño year, a period of greater than normal precipitation.

The Japanese recently launched their new Himawari 8 weather satellite, the world's first geostationary weather satellite. The satellite can shoot 16 different kinds of high resolution, allowing observation of an area as small as 500 square meters. The entire cost of the Himawari project is about \$680 million, according to the agency. Scientists are hopeful that it will help forecast typhoon movements and heavy rainfall.

If their prediction comes true, El Niño will break our drought cycle. However, the news has been full of on-again, off-again El Niño forecasts for months. I for one will wait and see. But it would sure be nice to have a real wet winter.

I'm sure that everyone was pleased to see that in June we EID customers achieved a level of water conservation greater than is being required by the state.

I have also been impressed (if I may say that) by all the brown lawns I see around the neighborhoods. We should all appreciate our neighbors who have sacrificed their lawns to keep us all in water for essential uses.

Congratulations to all of you for your water-saving efforts!

Additionally, customers currently enrolled in the company's Recyclebank program pay may reduce their bimonthly bill by \$2.00 if they choose to opt out of the program.

El Dorado Disposal has more than 12,400 residential customers in El Dorado Hills and made more than 1.2 million trash and recycling pickups during the 2014-15 fiscal year. The waste management company also organized two community clean-up events where area residents dropped off more than 52 tons of unwanted goods.

As part of its commitment to the environment, El Dorado Disposal plans to expand its recycling efforts in the coming year. The company will now accept motor oil, batteries, fluorescent tubes, and paint, but only in special containers furnished by the company, on regular pickup days. Residents should call El Dorado Disposal to request the special containers, and the containers will be delivered to their home.

Plans to partner with the El Dorado County Sheriff's Department and local neighborhood watch groups are in the works, as well. Under the new program, El Dorado Disposal drivers will alert police if they witness any suspicious activity while on their routes. "We live here too," said England. "This is a partnership. We want to work with residents to keep our community clean and safe."

## RISK RISES FOR LYME DISEASE

As the weather warms, increased time outside increases the risk for encounters with ticks, which can be carriers of Lyme disease, say health officials.

Lyme disease is transmitted to humans through the bite of infected blacklegged ticks, known as deer ticks. The Western blacklegged tick is found in many areas across California.

Protect yourself from ticks with proper clothing and insect repellent, by performing daily tick checks, removing attached ticks quickly and correctly, and reducing the tick habitat. Using tick collars on animals and checking them daily is important, as well.

Because deer are the main food source for adult ticks, discourage deer around your yard by removing shrubs and constructing physical barriers that keep deer away. ~

## MASSIVE EL NIÑO GROWING IN CALIFORNIA?

There is growing evidence California could see an even stronger El Niño event this winter than the 1997 one that caused massive flooding across Northern California.

Stunning images from Japan's Himawari 8 Weather Satellite, just recently activated, show what could become a historic El Niño in full bloom.

"Almost all models are showing consistency that we're seeing a stronger and stronger tendency for that to hold in place through the winter season. It could rival that of 1997," News10-KXTV Chief Meteorologist Monica Woods said.

In recent days, cyclones and typhoons, including one mammoth storm heading toward China with cloud cover the size of Texas, have helped shift the trade winds from west to east, pushing warm sub-surface water toward the coast of South America and making it all but certain an El Niño event will last at least through the fall.

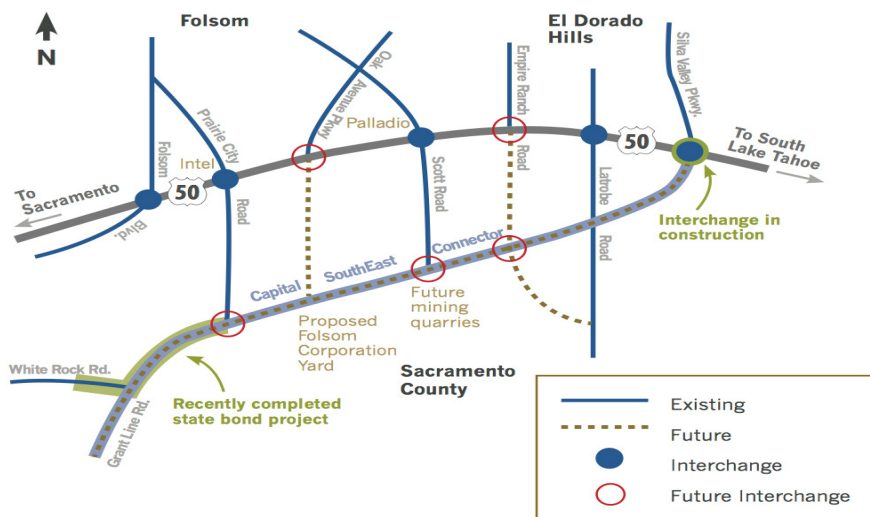
"What we want is just enough water to come in slowly enough for the watersheds to hold that," Woods said. "The nice thing is that so many of them are dry that they have the capacity, but the flip side of that is, as anybody knows in a desert climate, that terrain is just parched and so a lot of that can be runoff if those storms are too warm."

In this El Niño year, if the models hold up — and climatologists said they seem almost certain it will — it could soon be the beginning of the end of California's historic drought, even if it may come at a price.

"Yes, El Niño's great, and it could provide us with relief and replenish some of these reservoirs," Woods said. "The flip side of that is it could mean catastrophic flooding, too." ~

## PLANS MOVE FORWARD ON EASTERN END OF CAPITAL SOUTHEAST CONNECTOR

The Capital SouthEast Connector Joint Powers Authority (JPA) is working on completion of the planned improvements to the eastern end of White Rock Road. The road segment from Prairie City Road to Latrobe Road is projected to be completed by 2020. The portion of White Rock Road from Latrobe Road to the Silva Valley Interchange is currently projected to be improved sometime in the future, perhaps by 2036.

Readers will recall that the improvements to the segment between the intersection of White Rock Road and Grant Line Road eastward to Prairie City Road were recently completed. The Prairie City-Latrobe project seeks to extend those improvements further eastward to Latrobe Road

The design guidelines for from Prairie City to the Sacramento-El County line call for a four- to six-lane expressway, a fully-divided facility with grade-separated interchanges, or signalized intersections, and frontage improvements.

The design guidelines for from the El Dorado County line to Latrobe Road call for a four-to six-lane thoroughfare, a partially-divided facility with signalized intersections, limited-access street connections, and frontage improvements. Where existing roadways are built out in El Dorado County, the El Dorado County design standards should be used where applicable.

The annual work program developed by the JPA for fiscal year 2015-16 provides for preliminary engineering and environmental documentation for the Prairie City-Latrobe segment, and they are currently in the Pre-

liminary Engineering and Environmental Documentation stage of development.

Over the course of the 2015-2016 fiscal year, a number of significant milestones are expected to be reached on the Prairie City-Latrobe segment, hopefully resulting in shovel-ready construction status in 2018. These milestones include approval of the roadway alignment, completion of the environmental process and approval of the CEQA document, solicitation of a qualified construction manager/general contractor, and obtaining approval for a final design contract.

## EID: BRIDLEWOOD CANYON LIFT STATION UPGRADES THIS SUMMER

The Bridlewood Canyon development is served by an existing sewer lift station located at the east end of Thornhill Drive near the dam. The lift station was constructed in 1989 and components are approaching the end of their useful life. El Dorado Irrigation District plans to make upgrades to the lift station as part of its current Capital Improvement Plan. New pumps, controls and a generator will be installed, in addition to an improved odor control system. The site will still be contained within the limits of the existing cyclone fence; the slates in the fence will be replaced as part of the project.

The District anticipates the project will start in the summer of 2015 and be completed around the end of the year. A contractor will be retained by the District to perform the work, which will primarily take place between 8 A.M. and 5 P.M., Monday through Friday. There may be a short period of night and weekend work when the pumps are being replaced.

The District is coordinating with the manager of Bridlewood Canyon HOA on a staging area. Walking access to the lake will be maintained, and all areas restored to pre-existing conditions.
